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Introduction

This was a year of successful reviews with the Partington Review of the Institute delivered in mid-2012 and the HEFCE Review of the School of Advanced Study in December 2012 which resulted in a commitment to the future funding of the School and its libraries by HEFCE. The Institute and its library look forward to continuing their national research promotion and facilitation work and playing their part in the School's active engagement in the national research agenda. In a separate development there was a formal recognition by the University that the Institute's library is managed by the Institute itself within the overall School's mission, marking the end of a long period of uncertainty arising from the University strategy of de-convergence of Institutes and their libraries.

The year saw further collaboration in joint research and events. The research initiatives are detailed in the research section by the various centres and projects, not least by the huge range of activities by the Sir William Dale Centre for Legislative Studies. Professor Xanthaki is to be congratulated in particular for her new edition of the classic work in her field, *Thornton's Legislative Drafting*. Events are characterised by the new collaboration with the Beijing Arbitration Commission and the joint international forum on commercial dispute resolution in China held at the Institute in June 2013 at which a detailed report was launched and will shortly be published by LexisNexis. In May 2013 the Institute library together with the British Library and the Socio-Legal Studies Association again organised a research workshop, this year concerning *Legal Biography*. The day was very successful and the library would like to thank all the speakers and those who assisted in the arrangements. It is understood that the papers will be published in full as a special issue of the *Journal of Law and Society*, will also appear in book form and edited versions will appear in *Legal Information Management*. For the future, the Institute is in discussion with the Law Section of the British Academy about joint events. A showcase conference to bring together funders and new research in law is under consideration, and the Institute intends to launch a centre for law and information policy in the New Year and collaborate in a joint centre with the London Institute of Space Policy and Law.

The major refurbishment of the building entered its second phase during Summer 2013. The work concentrated on floor L1 of the Institute to replace infrastructure which had reached the end of its useful life as well as to improve its teaching and seminar rooms and lecture theatre and install the latest technology for presentation and event recording. The work also prepared areas on floor L2 to extend the on-site capacity to hold its historic collections of library materials. The refurbishment works did not directly affect the Library which remained open for its normal hours. Staff and users of the Institute again displayed considerable patience and flexibility during the refurbishment, and research support services were maintained with minimal disruption. In addition to modernising the building there has been considerable initial work with external consultants on a logo redesign and identity project and on a major IALS website redesign and web database upgrade.

The Institute Library continues to thrive and attract extremely high satisfaction rates among its readers. It has extended its activities in a variety of ways through its own research and publication, the development of new research tools and its hosting of the British and Irish

Legal Information institute (BAILII) and in research training. It has also further extended its opening hours as part of the longstanding successful collaboration with the postgraduate taught programmes of the Colleges of the University of London.

Professor Avrom Sherr took sabbatical leave to become Director on Sabbatical at the end of 2012. The Institute and its Advisory Council all express their thanks to Professor Avrom Sherr for his successful tenure and distinguished service to the Institute. It should be recorded how popular Professor Sherr is with staff and students of the Institute. Jules Winterton, who had been the Librarian of the Institute for many years, was appointed Director in April 2013 and combines the duties of Director and Librarian; it is hoped that the continuity of the appointment will be of value to the Institute.

Global Law Library and Research Services

The Review of the School by HEFCE in December 2012 recognised that the library resources of the Institutes of the School of Advanced Study are 'a unique facility' and their contribution is 'integral to SAS's overall mission to deliver RPF' (research promotion and facilitation). The formal recognition by the University that the Institute's library is properly part of the Institute within the overall School's mission is an endorsement of the management of the library as a strategic arm of the Institute. There was again a record overall number of 6,545 readers admitted to the library. Responding to the needs of University of London LLM students, the library extended its opening hours again, opening until 11pm on weekdays and on Sundays for a further three months, now from the start of October until mid-June. The eleventh annual IALS Library Reader Satisfaction Survey in March 2013 again recorded very high levels of user satisfaction with the library. The consistently excellent results demonstrate the effectiveness of the library and the high value which readers place on its services.

The library continued to host BAILII, the British and Irish Legal Information Institute, whose vast database of primary legal materials attracts intense use. IALS library continued to be responsible for the research into UK academic law libraries by an annual survey funded jointly by the Society of Legal Scholars and the British and Irish Association of Law Librarians and a report will appear in *Legal Information Management* in the Winter 2013 issue. The Deputy Librarian, in association with the International Association of Law Libraries, completed a survey of major legal research libraries around the world which will be published in the *International Journal of Legal Information*. The Library continued a wide range of other research support activities for its national constituencies including providing training sessions for over 1,200 people in the use of e-resources, updating and extending its free-to-Internet legal research tools, again organising outreach activities including roadshows to seven universities around the UK and promoting its services at the annual conference of the Society of Legal Scholars. The Library also organised several national training days and a collaborative research workshop.

In collaboration with the Bodleian Law Library, the British Library, the Squire Law Library, and SOAS Library, IALS started a major project to update the award-winning FLAG Foreign Law Guide. The project will involve updating the descriptions of the collections of foreign primary law materials in UK libraries and rebuilding the FLAG database, which is freely available as a national resource for the law on the web. The project is funded by members of the FLARE Group of UK major law libraries and BIALL:

A new software system and new multi-function devices have been installed to provide improved public copy / print / scan services. The new Pharos system has a number of advantages for readers: it is a cardless system and readers will have self-created credit accounts so no lost cards; self-service scanning will be available for the first time; the software will allow readers to send print jobs from their own laptops to photocopiers / printers; it will be possible to pay by credit card over the web as well as by cash onsite. The new system and new equipment were installed at the end of July 2013 and were brought into operation for the new academic year.

Research Services (see also Appendix V and VI)

Institute Membership

There was again a new record number of people choosing to register at the Institute Library after a 20% increase over the previous two years. In this case there was only a marginal increase; 6,545 readers were admitted compared to 6,509 in the previous year with a slightly larger proportion admitted on a temporary basis. There was an increase in the number of UL LLM students by 71 to 1,771 and in the number of University of London teachers of law from 980 to 1,011. Several of the other admissions figures fell back a little after two years of dramatic increases (in the previous year alone: a 29 per cent increase in the numbers of teachers of law from other universities and 39 per cent from overseas universities, 28 per cent in students from other universities in the UK, and 178 per cent increase in academic staff in other disciplines).

Use of Research Resources

The overall number of physical visits to the library for the year decreased by about 3.8 per cent and the peak daily figure of 736 returned to 2010-11 levels. The use of commercial electronic services showed an overall increase compared with previous years and there was again significant variation in the databases used (see Appendix V, Table 2) with a decrease in use of both the major databases, Lexis and Westlaw but an increase in the use of HeinOnline, to which additional modules were added, and in the use of newly-acquired databases. Use of the electronic resources produced by IALS grew again, particularly the full-text resources such as the digitised version of selected printed collections (see below). The Institute continued to licence and distribute two major and growing databases, HeinOnline and LLMC Digital, to all members of the University of London law teaching colleges (use at colleges is not included in the statistics). Loans of printed books from the main research collections fell by about 4,700 and loans from the short loan collection for UL LLM students fell by about 2,500 to 12,285. Increasing amounts of the materials, including e-books as well as journals, are now also available in electronic form and remote access now accounts for over 30% of use of commercial electronic resources.

Research Training

The library's electronic information training sessions for researchers and LLM students continued to develop and a total of 1,256 people attended during 2012/2013. This is very similar to the record total of 1,285 places in the previous year and a good performance bearing in mind that the Access Librarian post was vacant pending recruitment during most of the autumn 2012 training programme. Although there is demand for more training especially in October, the size of the training room and the number of trainers limit numbers.

During the Spring and Summer of 2013 the library offered individual advice sessions to LLM and MPhil/PhD students from all UK universities researching for their dissertations. These are one-to-one advice sessions tailored to the individual student's research needs, and normally last from 30 to 60 minutes, by appointment. Staff also offered one-to-one help with document creation and management for LLM and MPhil/PhD students. In 2012/2013 the combined total was 196 attendee appointments which amounted to over 120 hours of library staff time, a new record compared to the total of 182 appointments taking under 100 hours in the previous year. These sessions continued to be very highly rated in the reader satisfaction survey and IALS is clearly meeting a need.

The Library together with the British Library and the Socio-Legal Studies Association organised another successful research workshop, this year concerning *Legal Biography* (described in more detail in the Short Courses and Training section below) and it is understood that the papers will be published in full as a special issue of the *Journal of Law and Society*, will also appear in book form, and edited versions will appear in *Legal Information Management*. The Library also organised a further series of three IALS National Training Days for PhD students in November 2012, March and May 2013 which attracted 134 research students from universities across the UK. Library staff continued to teach on the intensive 'Introduction to Legal Research Methods' course for new MPhil and PhD students. Introductory tours of the library were given to 792 readers. Roadshows including presentations of the library's national services and collections at the universities of Swansea, Manchester, Kent, Sheffield, Hull, Aberystwyth and Plymouth, in collaboration with the local law departments. The Institute Library again promoted its services at a stand at the Society of Legal Scholars conference held in Edinburgh in September 2013.

Many online research guides were updated during the Spring and Summer of 2013 and most of the research guides, subject guides and other library guides were converted to use the LibGuides software which is now in widespread use. The library continues to issue an electronic library newsletter three times per year and notifies law schools and law libraries by email. A monthly information email is sent to all library members.

LLM Services

IALS library continued to provide comprehensive library support for the college-based LLM programmes of the University of London. Liaison was maintained between the Institute and the law schools and between IALS library and college law librarians and individual law teachers, collecting and checking reading lists and developing the collections according to their recommendations. The extension of opening hours proved extremely popular with LLM students from whom almost all of the requests for extended opening had been received. The number of postgraduate taught course law students admitted under service level agreements with University of London colleges increased from 1,697 to 1,771 after reduced recruitment in the previous two years. Numbers attending induction sessions and the various training opportunities offered by the Library continued to increase throughout the period.

The library again organised two dedicated open days for University of London LLM students, welcoming and registering new students, providing lectures and tours for 599 students. Senior library staff also participated at the induction programmes for postgraduate law students in colleges. Library services continued to be extended to LLM students at other universities in London under appropriate financial arrangements.

Subscription Services

A new full-time appointment of a Document Supply Services Supervisor was made at start of the year. Although the electronic document delivery service continues to be an important service for the legal profession there has been a gradual decline in enquiries and items supplied over several years. A marketing campaign launched at the end of Summer 2013 to increase membership and has had some initial success.

Information Resources (see also Appendix VII)

The collections continue to be developed at a steady rate despite the continued 'flat funding' of the library over many years, a vacant post in the department while a new member of staff was recruited, and an effective loss of part of the time of another member of staff to other duties which placed an additional burden on staff of the section.

Many electronic books are available within electronic packages and databases but this year an investigation of the availability of additional individual e-books was concluded, a supplier chosen, and a pilot project begun to make them available.

A pilot project was undertaken to explore the feasibility of updating sections of the library's classification system. The catalogue was further enriched by a further batch of high quality bibliographic records representing individual titles available in the LLMC Digital database and there is a clear increase in the use of the database following this project.

The library continues to respond to researchers' preference for online resources in particular subject areas while ensuring that it is able to provide strong research collections and maintain its role as a library of last resort for printed legal materials. The library negotiated a price with HeinOnline to enable the Institute to supply the re-launched *Index to Foreign Legal Periodicals* to the whole of the University of London. A subscription was placed for the *i-Law* maritime and commercial database (now renamed *Lloyd's Law Reports Premier* package) and the library's *Justis* subscription was extended to the *International Law Reports*, the *Singapore Law Reports*, and the *Eastern Caribbean Supreme Court Judgments*.

This year the focus for development of the foreign monograph collections was Latin America, particularly Brazil and Argentina. The collections of codes for the Netherlands and Spain were updated and books were bought for the small San Marino collection. No new print subscriptions were bought but considerable updating took place of law reports for Swaziland, Zambia and Uganda and the new consolidation of legislation for Sri Lanka was obtained. The library continued to review its print collections in close liaison with the Bodleian Law Library and the Squire Law Library, and cancelled a number of journal titles.

The library would like to thank the individual scholars who donated books to the library. The library would also like to acknowledge the generosity of Thomson Reuter and LexisNexis for their continuing support of legal scholarship through assistance to the library.

Archives

During the year 197 items from the archives were consulted, eight researchers were assisted in person and 21 other enquiries were answered. Researchers continued to be mainly academic but also included legal biographers and family historians from the UK and overseas, including France, China, Japan and South Africa. Material to supplement existing archives was received including a transfer of a small historical archive relevant to legal education from the Bar Council which has paid for the cataloguing and organisation of the records.

Information Systems

The Information Systems Team continued to make important contributions to the successful combined operation and development of IALS and its Library and to the skills training programmes of presentations and one-to-one sessions with researchers. Development and promotion of web resources and national online legal research tools has again been a key activity and several initiatives are described under research facilitation services below.

The information systems team have been involved in a large number of major projects during the year. A laptop loan service was introduced for readers within the library. The team maintained and developed the IALS website and the Facebook and Twitter channels. More than 2,000 people 'like' the Institute and its Library on Facebook, an increase of 50% since the previous year. In addition there has been considerable initial work with external consultants on a logo redesign and identity project and on a major IALS website redesign and web database upgrade. There has also been the options assessment, preparatory work and implementation of the Pharos (print, scan and copy system) project. The team also led network infrastructure discussions, audio visual and lecture capture equipment assessments and installations as part of the IALS building refurbishment programme. Throughout, the information systems team continued to support public computing facilities including the WIALS wireless Internet access service and deliver Institute-wide support to all staff and students.

The Information Services Manager continued to play an important part in the wider University, within SAS as well as in collaboration with Senate House Libraries and the University of London Computing Centre.

Research Facilitation Services

The Institute continues to make available a growing portfolio of digital research tools.

BAILII, the British and Irish Legal Information Institute (<http://www.bailii.org>), based at IALS, continues to develop its huge website of legal materials and extend its coverage. The system responded to over 3.8 million page views and downloads during the year and has an average of 1,868 visitors each day throughout the year.

IALS Student Law Review. The inaugural issue of the *IALS Student Law Review*, a new electronic open access peer-reviewed run by the research students of the Institute, was made freely available online in SAS Open Journals in September 2013 with assistance from the information systems team. It is hoped that this initiative might form the model for a service to the legal community to host open access electronic journals.

Privy Council Documents Project. A collection of decisions from the Judicial Committee's library in Downing Street was scanned and included in the BAILII database. A collection of related records and documents forming the case papers is held by IALS. IALS is scanning some of these documents and creating an online finding tool, the Privy Council Decisions Documents Directory to raise awareness of its collection of valuable historical documents and help increase access for legal researchers. Training for Legal Information Management

The Institute continued to play a major role in training law librarians for the UK, hosting three graduate trainee posts, and again welcoming staff from other law libraries including new law librarians from the British Library and the Inns of Court libraries at its in-house training workshops.

During the year the library successfully applied to the Commonwealth Scholarships Commission to host Joseph Semugabi, Librarian of the Law Development Centre in Kampala, as a Commonwealth Professional Fellow in 2013-14 and appointed Bård Tuseth, Law Librarian of the University of Oslo as Visiting Fellow in Law Librarianship for 2013-14.

National & International Professional Activities

Eleanor Dale joined IALS in the Library's Information Resources department in November 2012 having recently completed her studies at Leeds University.

Lisa Davies joined IALS in October 2012 from Norton Rose as Access Librarian. She organised the IALS 2012/2013 Roadshows programme, speaking at the law faculties of Swansea, Manchester, Kent, Sheffield, Hull and Aberystwyth Universities, at the IALS National Training Day in May 2012, and represented IALS at the SLS Annual Conference in Edinburgh in September 2013. She was appointed Chair of the BIALL (British and Irish Association of Law Librarians) Awards and Bursaries Committee in June 2013.

David Gee was again responsible for the programme of national training days at IALS and jointly organised with the British Library and the Socio-Legal Studies Association an event in May 2013, 'Legal Biography'. He, with Laura Griffiths, carried out the annual survey of academic law libraries in the UK and Ireland sponsored by the British and Irish Association of Law Librarians (BIALL) and the Society of Legal Scholars and his report will appear in *Legal Information Management*. He also carried out a survey of major law libraries around the world with the support of the International Association of Law Libraries (IALL) and his report will appear in the *International Journal of Legal Information*. He was a Research Fellow at the Max Planck Institute of International and Comparative Private Law in Hamburg during

September 2012. In July 2013 he was elected to the Board of IALL and appointed to its Scholarships and Education Committees

Laura Griffiths continued as a joint compiler of the *Legal Information Management* current awareness column. She, with David Gee, jointly carried out the annual survey of academic law libraries in the UK and Ireland sponsored by the British and Irish Association of Law Librarians (BIALL) and the Society of Legal Scholars. She spoke at the IALS Roadshows at the law faculties of Swansea, Kent and Plymouth Universities, at the National Training Day in May 2012, and represented IALS at the SLS Annual Conference in Edinburgh.

Narayana Harave continued to represent IALS at meetings of the JISC Resource Centre for London System Administrators Group and presented sessions at the IALS National Training Days for PhD students.

Gerry Power re-joined IALS on a temporary basis as the Project Manager for the FLAG database update project in May 2013.

Katherine Read continued as a member of the Editorial Board of *Legal Information Management* and joint compiler of its quarterly current awareness column. She spoke at the IALS Roadshow at the University of Hull Faculty of Law.

Hester Swift spoke at the IALS Roadshows at the law faculties of Manchester, Sheffield and Plymouth Universities and at the IALS National Training Days in November 2012 and March 2013. She also continued as Secretary of the EU Databases User Group. She has been a key contributor to the FLAG Foreign Law Guide upgrade project, assisting with the reassessment of the collections at several university libraries in London.

Steve Whittle spoke at the IALS National Training Days for PhD students. He continued as a member of the SAS-Space Working Group, the School Digital Resources Working Group considering the School's information systems service requirements, and the School Statistics Working Group. He attended the systems librarian meetings of the Bloomsbury Library Management System project.

Jules Winterton was Acting Director of the Institute from July 2012 and was appointed Director in March 2013, retaining his responsibilities for overall management of the Library. He served as Immediate Past President of the International Association of Law Libraries until September 2013 when he stepped down from the Board. He was Associate Professor at the Kwame Nkrumah University of Science and Technology and a member of the Board of the Ghana Institute of Advanced Legal Studies. He was Convenor of the Libraries Committee of the Society of Legal Scholars, a trustee of the British and Irish Legal Information Institute, Chair of the FLARE consortium, a member of the Library Committee of the School of Slavonic and East European Studies, and a member of two committees of the Chinese and American Forum on Legal Information and Law Libraries. He was appointed to the editorial boards of the *Foreign Law Guide* and the *Journal of Open Access Law*.

Lesley Young continued to serve on the Library Commodity Group of the London Universities Purchasing Consortium and as serials representative for the LUPC, working on the tender for serials supply. She continued to be a member of the steering committee of the FLARE Consortium and to liaise closely with the British Library.

Research

Financial Services Law and Regulation Project

The financial services law and regulation project completed several academic papers and articles and an edited research handbook in 2012-2013. During this period, Professor Kern Alexander continued his research and writing on legal and regulatory reform of the European and UK banking industry. His articles were published in the *Journal of Banking Law*, *Journal of the European Law Academy*, and the *Journal of Comparative Law*, and the *Archiv des Völkerrechts*. He completed book chapters in the *Research Handbook on Insider Dealing Law* entitled 'UK insider dealing and market abuse law' and in *Perspectives on Credit Ratings* entitled 'Regulating Ratings and Bank Capital Regulation' respectively. He also facilitated academic research by serving as the chief editor of the *Research Handbook on International Financial Regulation* (Elgar, 2012) and as an editor in the Butterworths publication *Money Laundering Law*.

The project's research has also had substantial impact on European and UK public policy. Alexander gave oral and written evidence to the House of Lords Committee on Europe in October 2012 on the European Union's proposals on *Banking Union*. His evidence critically analysed the proposal to give the European Central Bank competence to supervise financial institutions and was cited extensively by the Committee in its final report issued in December 2012. In addition, Alexander has continued his work as a Member of the European Parliament's Expert Panel on Financial Services. In this capacity, he advises the European Parliament's Committee on Economic and Monetary Affairs (ECON). Specifically, he has written several reports analysing the institutional structure of European financial regulation and the implementation of international bank capital regulation. At the international level, Alexander's research on the impact of macro-prudential financial regulation on developing countries was presented at the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) annual meeting on financial services in Geneva in March 2013.

The project has embarked on a major new initiative with the University of Cambridge's Centre for Financial Analysis and Policy Judge Business School on a project analysing the implications of the Basel Capital Accord (Basel III) on financial regulation and sustainable development. This research initiative is sponsored by the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and Bloomberg New Energy Finance. In addition, Alexander was appointed as a lead expert by the UK Serious Fraud Office in its investigations of Libor rate-rigging by British banks in which Alexander is providing oral and written evidence to the SFO in its various Libor investigations. The project is also linked with the University of Zurich Faculty of Law on a project examining bank resolution regimes.

Legal Education and the Legal Profession

Much of the work in legal education during this year was devoted to the Legal Education and Training Review carried out on behalf of the Solicitors Regulation Authority, the Bar Standards Board and CILEX, documented at <http://letr.org.uk/>. The Review constituted a fundamental, evidence-based review of education and training requirements across

regulated and non-regulated legal services in England and Wales. It considered in the main issues relating to regulation of legal education rather than education itself. Most of the empirical research involved discovering from law students, lawyers and others involved in the system what they thought was wrong with legal education and what they might be prepared to accept in order to make changes.

IALS participated in the research consortium which informed the Report. The Report, *Setting Standards: the future of legal service education and training regulation in England and Wales* came out in June 2013 suggesting a new approach to the consideration of competence at qualification. This approach would enable more easy movement between different professions, different grades and different areas of work.

Several events have taken place in response to the Report and it has been decided that the 2014 W G Hart Workshop, Directed by Professor Avrom Sherr, will be devoted to the subject of education and training and the legal profession.

Sir William Dale Centre for Legislative Studies

The Centre flourished in the past year, enjoying peer and “industry” recognition within the UK and abroad. The LLM in Advanced Legislative Studies attracted a total of 12 overseas students in its London and Distance Learning constituencies. Programme and course evaluations from students and external examiners have been excellent. The 2013 Commonwealth Course in Legislative Drafting attracted 13 students (see the Short Courses and Training section).

The Twelfth Sir William Dale Memorial Lecture took place on Thursday 22 November 2012 at the IALS. The Rt Hon Lord Justice Lloyd Jones, Chairman of the Law Commission and Lord Justice of Appeal discussed "The Law Commission and the implementation of law reform".

There was considerable research and publication activity at the Centre. Dr. Stefanou took over the *European Journal of Law Reform* (EJLR) as the Managing Editor, transforming the approach of the EJLR so that it becomes a ‘textbook journal’ with three special issues on different aspects of law as well as a general issue per year. The EJLR now aims to become a top rated journal. Dr Stefanou was also keynote speaker in Conferência Internacional sobre o Systema Juridico Inglês, British Council / FIEPE / TJPE, Recife, Brazil, 5-7 December 2012 and at the IALS / Panteion workshop on "Legislative process and legislative drafting" on 1 April 2013. Dr Stefanou is now also the academic advisor to the IALS Student Law Review. Dr Stefanou’s new duties include representation in the School’s AQSC and Research Committee while his academic duties at the IALS now include involvement with the LLM in International Corporate Governance, Financial Regulation and Economic Law as well as being overall Director of taught programmes.

Professor Xanthaki edited two journal issues in legislative drafting, one in the EJLR and one in the *Commonwealth Law Bulletin*. She published the 5th edition of the leading work in her field, *Thornton’s Legislative Drafting* and a number of articles including: “Legislative drafting: The birth of a new sub-discipline of law”, [2013] 1 *IALS Student Review* 57-70; “Editorial” [2013] *European Journal of Law Reform*, forthcoming (together with Cherie Booth, QC); “Legislative Techniques in Rwanda: Present and Future” [2013] *European*

Journal of Law Reform, forthcoming (together with others); "Foreword" [2013] *39 Commonwealth Law Bulletin* 411-413; "EU Legislative quality post-Lisbon: the challenges of Smart Regulation" [2013] *Statute Law Review*, forthcoming; "Legal transplants and comparative concepts: eclecticism defeated?" [2013] *Statute Law Review* 128-137 (together with Coen van Laer); and "Crossing the borders between legislative drafting and linguistics: linguists to the aid of legislative drafters" 1 [2013] *NovaLogos* 83-109 (with Giulia Adriana Pennisi). She offered written evidence at the House of Lords Select Committee on the EU, Sub-Committee F (Home Affairs, Health and Education) on 'The EU's five year agenda for EU justice and home affairs activity (2015-2019) 17-21.

Professor Xanthaki spoke at a number of conferences: "Phronetic Legislative Drafting: liberating for the drafter, easy for the reader", Workshop on Quality of EU Legislation, 17 October 2013, Dutch Academy of Legislation, The Hague; "Standards for legislation in Civil and Common Law Countries: features, practices, common ground", Workshop on Common quality standards for legislation in different legal traditions as an inspiration for legal reform, 9 April 2013, Cape Town; "Scrutiny of legislative quality", Workshop, 1 April 2013, Panteion University of Athens; "Phronetic Legislative Drafting: the birth of a new theory for lawmaking", Seminar, 22 January 2013, University of Stockholm. Finally, Professor Xanthaki is participating in the Workshop on Good Law organised by the OPC. The Good Law Working Group includes experts with varied backgrounds and users of legislation. Its sessions will be introduced by Richard Heaton, Permanent Secretary of the Cabinet Office and First Parliamentary Counsel, and by Hayley Rogers, Director General at OPC and good law team leader. The conversations will focus on content and language of legislation, architecture of the statute book and publication, and will be lead and facilitated by senior policy makers, drafters, bill managers, and legal informatics experts.

The Centre acquired funding from the European Commission for a £200,000 project on "Protecting victims' rights in the EU; an aid to the implementation of the European Directive establishing minimum standards on the rights, support and protection of victims of crime together with: the Centre for European Constitutional Law Themistokles & Dimitris Tsatsos Foundation. Further applications for funding are pending.

The Centre welcomed Hayley Rogers, OPC; Giulia Andiana Pennisi; William Robinson; and Dr. Mazhar Ilahi as new Sir William Dale Fellows. Hayley has been instrumental in the Centre's cooperation with the OPC. Giulia has undertaken leadership of the Drafting and Language initiative. William has undertaken leadership of the Drafting and the EU initiative. And Mazhar is one of the Legislative Drafting Clinic directors.

The Centre was instrumental in establishing the IALS Think Tank for Law Reform. The IALS Think Tank is an initiative aiming to collect the valuable expertise of the many Fellows and staff of the IALS, invite proposals for law reform, selecting the most appropriate one, offering feedback and advice for its refinement, endorsing the final product, and submitting it to the Commission in time for its consideration in the public consultation for its programmes. It is chaired by Professor Xanthaki, and its members include, in alphabetical order, Prof. Philip Baker, QC; Ronan Cormacain; Daniel Greenberg; Professor Andy Haynes; Stephen Mason; Dr. Constantin Stefanou; and Dr. Simone White. The panel received proposals from the IALS community at the end of August 2013 and made its selection on the basis of the criteria put forward by the Law Commission of England and Wales. It is with

great pleasure that the Think Tank endorses the proposal of Stephen Mason, which now constitutes the Mason Report of the IALS Think Tank on the reform of the law concerning the presumption that mechanical instruments, in particular computers (now an out-of-date concept), are 'in order'.

New networks were added to those already enjoyed by the Centre. The Centre consolidated its cooperation with the Panteion University of Athens. Professor Ismini Kriari, Academic Vice-Rector of Panteion University, visited the IALS as an Erasmus scholar in February 2013, and offered lectures in bioethics. Professor Helen Xanthaki and Dr. Constantin Stefanou spoke at the joint IALS / Panteion workshop on "Legislative process and legislative drafting" on 1 April 2013. Professor Xanthaki explored the definition and elements of legislative quality, and analyzed the utility of effectiveness as a universal criterion of quality. Dr. Stefanou analyzed the elements of the legislative process in the UK, and identified the main characteristics of the legislative drafting process and their roots. The workshop, organized expertly by Professor Kriari, was a huge success with more than 200 attendees from the organizing University, and the University of Athens.

The Winter School "The Parliaments of Europe in Democracy Promotion and Constitutional Transitions" (PaDeCo), funded by the European Commission within the Erasmus Intensive Programmes, is organized by a University network composed of the School of Government, University Luiss Guido Carli, Rome; the Institute of Advanced Legal Studies, University of London; the Institut d'Etudes Politiques, University of Bordeaux; the University of Hull. The programme offers 10 IALS students the opportunity to take the course in Rome on a fully funded basis. A further Summer School is being organised in Stockholm for August 2013 with the participation of seven European Universities.

Fellowships

The Institute offers each year a number of Visiting Fellowships intended to create working relationships with scholars from other institutions, from overseas or in the United Kingdom, undertaking work within fields covered by or adjacent to its own research programmes. This year twelve visiting fellowships were awarded (see Appendix IV for a full list) and a selection from their reports appears below.

Professor Nicola Lupo (Luiss University, Rome) and Dr Guilia Pennisi (University of Palermo) both worked in association with the Sir William Dale Centre for Legislative Studies. In particular Professor Pennisi participated in a Workshop on Legislative Drafting and Language hosted by IALS in June which opened a productive dialogue between drafters and linguists. Professor Lupo, researching on the impact of jurisprudence of the European Court of Human Rights on the National systems of the sources of law, collaborated with IALS to promote two successful applications to the Erasmus Intensive Programme.

Professor Megan Richardson from Melbourne School of Law worked on a research project on law reform methodologies with particular application to privacy law which was particularly topical in light of current events in the British media. She published papers on privacy law reform in the *European Journal of Law Reform* and in *Amicus Curiae*.

During his visit Dr Zhu Xiaochuan from the China Europe International Business School was able to finish a draft report on how different local governments raise money through capital markets in countries like the UK, the USA and China and also worked on articles on fraud prevention and localism in the UK.

Dr Julie Clarke from Deakin University, Australia was working towards completion of a book on International Merger Regulation which was published by Edward Elgar in 2013. She felt she had made significant progress on her research while at IALS and described the Library as 'second-to none'.

The main research of Professor Mathias Siems of Durham Law School concerned his book on Comparative Law (Cambridge University Press) which aims to present a fresh contextualised and cosmopolitan perspective on comparative law, critically discusses established approaches to comparative law, but also presents more modern ones, such as socio-legal and numerical comparative law. Special emphasis is given to the impact of globalisation on legal systems.

The Inns of Court Fellowship was awarded to the Honourable Justice Mark O'Regan, President of the New Zealand Court of Appeal who was undertaking research on "Looking through trusts" which involved a study of legislative provisions allowing a Court to treat property held in trust as if it were the property of the settler or of any other person who has de facto control of the trust. He chose this area because he wanted to work in an area where he could learn something new and used the opportunity to do considerable reading on the law of trusts generally, including the historical separation of common law and equity and the historical development of uses and trusts to circumvent some of the rigidity of the common law. During his visit he attended a number of functions at the Inns and also met with Judges of the Supreme Court of the United Kingdom, the Court of Appeal and the High Court.

Associate Research Fellowships and Senior Associate Research Fellowships were conferred on 50 scholars and practitioners who are closely connected with the Institute and whose valuable contributions variously include research, assisting with MPhil / PhD supervision and other complementary activities. A full list of these appointments can be found in Appendix IV.

On 28th November a lunch seminar was held for Visiting Fellows, Associate Research Fellows and research students. Each of the visiting fellows gave a brief presentation on the research they were undertaking at IALS, followed by a discussion. This successful new venture will be extended in 2013-14 with a series of seminars fortnightly during term given by Visiting Fellows.

Seminars, Public Lectures, Conferences and Workshops

During the past year the Institute continued to organise a wide ranging programme of conferences, workshops, lectures and seminars, covering topics as diverse as “ Copyright and Digital Media: the view from Japan” to “The Emergence of Privatering: the seventeenth foundation of prize law”. Particular mention should also be made of an innovative half day conference on “Legislative Drafting and Language” which brought together academics and drafters in an interdisciplinary atmosphere.

The 2013 W G Hart Legal Workshop was held in June 2013 on the remarkably topical subject of media law - “The Constitution of the public Sphere: the post-Leveson Landscape” – touching on many of the issues raised in Justice Leveson’s inquiry. Papers were given by academics, practitioners and regulators, from both within and outside UK, bringing together many different ideas and approaches to the question of media law and regulation. As well as an array of academic contributions, others were given by Philip Coppel QC, Geoffrey Robertson QC and Hugh Tomlinson QC. The press was represented by Gill Phillips, Director of Editorial Legal Services at the Guardian new and Media Ltd. Regulators from the UK and abroad, included John Horgan, the Irish Press Ombudsman, Michael McManus, Director of Transition at the Press Complaints Commission; and Chris Mhike of the Zimbabwe Media Commission. The Institute is particularly grateful to the Workshop’s Academic Directors, Dr Eoin Carolan (University College Dublin) and Dr Andrew Scott (London School of Economics) for bringing together such a diverse range of speakers and creating an opportunity for truly creative discussions between academia and the professions.

Another new venture in June 2013 was the first in a series of annual conferences to be held in conjunction with the Beijing Arbitration Commission, arising out of a new memo of understanding between IALS and the BAC. IALS was delighted to welcome a panel of distinguished arbitrators from Beijing and the conference had a capacity audience reflecting the interest raised by subject matter.

Teaching and Training

Early in 2013, oral and written evidence was presented to a Review of Teaching Programmes in the School of Advanced Study conducted by Professor Malcolm Cook of Exeter University. It was well received and an early response was made to the recommendations which emerged from the Review. The Review endorsed the role of taught programmes, which the Institute undertakes in niche areas of law, in the Institutes. Dr Constantin Stefanou took on the role of Director of Taught Programmes to strengthen and streamline academic management. The appointment in September 2013 of a permanent Student Services Officer for the IALS taught postgraduate programmes will hopefully strengthen administrative support from the School which has centralised registry functions.

LLM in Advanced Legal Studies & LLM in Advanced Legal Studies via Distance Learning

The LLM in Advanced Legislative Studies, a flagship degree in the subject prized by governments around the world, attracted a total of 12 overseas students in its London and Distance Learning constituencies. Programme and course evaluations from students and external examiners have been excellent. Both LLM programmes are thankful to Sir Stephen Laws for his contribution of five lectures for the Themes in Legislative Studies modules.

MA in Taxation

2012-13 was the fifth year of running the MA in Taxation (Law, Administration and Practice). It was an extremely successful year from the academic point of view. The MA in Taxation (Law, Administration and Practice) Examination Board was held on 29 October 2013. Both external examiners were in attendance. The Examination Board recommended that fourteen students should be awarded the degree, five with distinctions. It also recommended that one student should be awarded the PG Diploma and that two students should be awarded the PG Certificate.

David Salter was appointed as the Academic Director of the MA in Taxation on 1 March 2013. The programme is very grateful to all the teachers and examiners who have contributed to another successful year for the MA in Taxation, and record our special thanks to Philip Baker QC for his continued and unstinting efforts in maintaining the excellence of the degree. Thanks should also be given to the students for their positive engagement with the degree. We are also delighted with the very high levels of student satisfaction, as expressed in student feedback, with the academic elements of the degree.

In his Review Professor Cook noted, in particular, the very wide range of optional modules available to MA in Tax Law students, the uniqueness of some modules, the enthusiasm of the students for tax and for a degree programme that met their needs (evident in student feedback and from the students he had met), and the efforts that are made to accommodate the particular needs of the student cohort, a number of whom are part-time.

The 2013-14 year begins with eighteen students registered for the MA in Taxation or the PG Certificate. The degree is now well established, and we have a good basis for expanding the numbers of students and modules on the MA in Taxation in the coming academic years.

LLM in International Corporate Governance, Financial Regulation and Economic Law

This unique interdisciplinary LLM programme is now entering into its sixth year and is increasingly gaining recognition at the national and international level. It is also well established in the global market of teaching and research in the law and regulation of financial services. Each year this LLM grows with the contributions of leading academics from around the world who are keen to contribute to this programme and its innovation in teaching methods and quality of teaching. This LLM in terms of the modules offered, the teaching team, the combination of research and teaching and the highly specialised modules is unique and fills a gap in linking the world of practice and academia in a manner not found elsewhere. This success is reflected in the feedbacks which received from students and the number of PhD students recruited from among our own LLM students.

Despite some difficulties of not being listed in some rankings and competition from other Universities the programme has managed to attract more students. The number of new students registered in October 2013 is 11. On 23 October 2013 the Board of Examiners of LLM in International Corporate Governance, Financial Regulation and Economic Law (ICGFREL) was held to ratify results from academic year of 2012-13. In this meeting which was chaired by Dr Constantin Stefanou, the Director of Taught Programmes and Co-Director of LLM in ICGFREL, Professor Peter Jaffey, external examiner from Brunel University, Ms Rachel Stickland, Registrar of the School of Advanced Study, Mr Christian Otta, Student Administrator for taught courses and Dr Mahmood Bagheri, Co-Course Director were present. 10 students graduated in 2012-13, with 6 gaining Merits and 4 being awarded a pass.

Postgraduate Research Programmes

Professor Helen Xanthaki became Director of Research Programmes at IALS. Nine new PhD students enrolled in the PhD programme with five further applications pending at the end of the year. One student deferred to January 2014 and one to September 2014.

An unprecedented seven PhD students have been included on pass lists for IALS in the year from September 2012, with five more pending for the November pass list. This is the highest crop of newly completed PhDs at IALS, and the Institute is exceptionally proud for the new Doctors and their supervisors.

With this increase in the community of IALS doctoral candidates there is an increase in the need to keep them engaged. The new chat facility offered to all students once a month offers them the ability to contact Professor Xanthaki directly irrespective of where their field study may have taken them. This is very popular, especially among part-time students who may be working during normal office hours. It is also seen as a lifeline for those abroad on field work. Further opportunities for engagement are offered by the new VLE page for PhD study with news relevant to PhD candidates. The new IALS PhD Study Guide collates all regulations at the University and School levels, whilst incorporating IALS specific practices.

Another initiative is the master classes in PhD Study, convened by Ronan Cormacain, PhD Researcher. The series of master classes offer our PhD community the opportunity to interact with experienced PhD supervisors, and to build support networks within the IALS and beyond.

The online open access *IALS Student Law Review* which is mentioned in the Publications section was wholly initiated and edited by research students of the IALS.

Schwarzenberger Prize

The Georg Schwarzenberger Prize in International Law was endowed by friends and former students of the late Professor Georg Schwarzenberger, formerly Emeritus Professor of International Law of the University of London, and is awarded annually to a student, or students, in the Faculty of Law in the University who is considered by the Director of the Institute to be outstanding in the field of public international law. The 2012-13 prize was awarded to Mr Sotirios Lekkas of University College London in respect of his outstanding performance in his LLM dissertation and examination.

Short Courses and Research Training

The 2013 Commonwealth Course in Legislative Drafting attracted 13 students, one of whom decided to proceed to the LLM in ALS this year. The Course benefited from an increased contribution of Parliamentary Counsel, including the organisation of a drafting workshop led by our new Fellow, Hayley Rogers, and OPC. The Law Commission's study visit was another highlight, offering students exclusive insight to the work of the Commission. The Home Office allowed us once again access to their induction programme thus letting into a wonderful window to policy making and drafting there. And we had the first session at the Foreign and Commonwealth Office, which offered staff and student exceptional insight to the eccentricities of drafting international treaties and their implementing measures.

The Institute Library together with the British Library and the Socio-Legal Studies Association again organised a research workshop, this year concerning *Legal Biography*. Speakers came from the British Library, the LSE, The University of Keele, Reading University, Lincoln's Inn, Lambeth Palace as well as the IALS. The day was extremely successful and the library would like to thank all the speakers and those who assisted in the arrangements. It is understood that the papers will be published in full as a special issue of the *Journal of Law and Society*, also appear in book form, and edited versions will appear in *Legal Information Management*.

Building on the success of the 2010/2011 and 2011/2012 programmes, IALS offered a programme of three national training days for MPhil and PhD in law students in 2012/2013 entitled, "How to get a PhD in Law". The three days were widely advertised to research students registered at universities across the UK and could be booked for a fee individually or as a programme. IALS academic and library staff mainly facilitated the programme and were augmented with other academic and administrative staff from the School of Advanced Study and a law publisher. Excellent or good feedback ratings and very positive comments were received for all three training days.

The national training day on 30th November 2012 aimed at "Meeting the challenges of the first year" and drew an audience of 41 PhD students from universities across the UK. The national training day on 16th March 2013 covered legal research skills, literature reviews, qualitative and quantitative research methods and comparative legal research and drew an audience of 53 PhD students. Finally the training day on 22nd May 2013 concentrated on preparing students for the mini-Viva and the Viva, presenting skills, publishing research and preparing for the Ethics Committee and drew an audience of 40 PhD students. Common features of all three trainings days were the inclusion of tailored training by senior IALS law librarians, optional library tours and networking opportunities for the attendees.

The Institute's Legal Research Methods Training Course was offered again by Professor Lisa Webley, and yet again attracted a high level of demand, and excellent feedback. The Course ran over a period of eight days in January 2013 with a majority of attendees from Queen Mary, University of London and the Institute of Advanced Legal Studies. The course aims to introduce a range of research methodologies relevant to PhD / MPhil research in law and legally related fields.

Publications

Articles on a wide range of subjects were featured in *Amicus Curiae*, the quarterly journal of the IALS and SALS. Professor Johan Henning, Professor of Law at the University of the Free State and Senior Associate Research Fellow in Comparative Company Law, contributed a piece on the challenges involved in interpreting the new South African Companies Act (Autumn 2012 issue). *Amicus Curiae* has always sought to reflect the expertise of leading commentators while also encouraging contributions from practitioners and academics in the early stages of their careers. It was therefore a pleasure to include in the Autumn 2012 issue 'Reducing overreliance on credit ratings: failing strategies and the need to start from scratch' by Francesco de Pascalis, PhD candidate in financial regulation at the IALS. The breadth of expertise displayed by *Amicus Curiae* authors was further illustrated in the Winter 2012 issue, which included articles on 'Stewardship and the insolvency practitioner: a review of the current position' (Professor David Milman, Lancaster University); 'Contemplating privatisation of China's rural land ownership' (Xiaoyang Zhang, Associate Professor at the Open University of Hong Kong); 'Defence cooperation in Europe in the context of the European Union's Common Defence and Security Policy: what has been, will be again?' (Theodore Konstadinides, Lecturer in Law, University of Surrey); and 'Human rights, colonialism and post-colonial conflict resolution: historical justice litigation' (Tom Frost, Lecturer in Law, University of Newcastle, and Sascha-Dominik Bachmann, Reader in International Law, University of Lincoln).

Amicus Curiae became the first journal to be made freely available through the Open Journal System, which was set up after work carried out by the JISC-funded Open Journals Project in the School of Advanced Study. Julian Harris, formerly the Institute's Publications Manager and the serving Deputy General Editor of *Amicus Curiae*, has acted as a consultant to the project, which has illustrated how electronic publishing can combine with traditional processes to produce wider access. In addition to editing *Amicus* over the year, he has maintained the Institute's link with two major looseleaf works published by Sweet & Maxwell. This has involved writing a newsletter published three times per year to provide an update service for subscribers to *Encyclopedia of Financial Services Law*, and producing regular releases to the *Anti-Money Laundering Guide*.

The inaugural issue of the *IALS Student Law Review*, a new electronic open access peer-reviewed journal initiated and run by the research students of the Institute, was made freely available online in SAS Open Journals in September 2013. This free-to-Internet contribution to legal scholarship has been created through the enthusiasm and dedication of the student community at the Institute which conceived and carried through the idea of a student-driven law review with the backing of the academic staff and the information systems team at the Institute. The Institute is unlike law schools around the country in concentrating on the promotion and facilitation of legal research on a national basis as well as postgraduate study and research. It has a relatively small student community but one which is well connected and outward looking with a network of research colleagues and practitioners around the world. The Editorial Board intend to draw on this network so the Law Review represents not only work being carried out by those at the Institute but also, in the tradition of the Institute, work carried out elsewhere which might benefit legal research as a whole by being brought before a wider audience. Society for Advanced Legal Studies

The Society for Advanced Legal Studies was established in 1997 as a learned society for the facilitation of research and high-level scholarship in law. It has sought to encourage greater collaboration in the legal profession, fostering increased interaction amongst academics, practitioners, members of the judiciary, others involved in the administration of justice both in Great Britain and overseas, as well as those not necessarily in the legal profession but whose work provides them with an interest in the law.

The Society is open to all those in possession of a postgraduate law degree or related discipline and / or who have the right to practise in Great Britain or elsewhere. Members of the profession with distinguished careers are elected to fellowship, while those with particularly notable careers in the law may be elected to an honorary fellowship. The Society counts amongst its members many of the senior judiciary in the United Kingdom, Law Officers, and a number of distinguished overseas lawyers.

During 2012-2013, the Society collaborated with organisations such as The Solicitors International Human Rights Group and The Human Rights Consortium on 16 events, while the Society's journal, *Amicus Curiae* published issue 92 (Winter 2012), edited by Mr Julian Harris. The Society also began a review and reorganisation of its administration. Membership queries are now being dealt with by Ms Claire Miller, Library Administrative Officer at the IALS. The Society's finances, have also improved on the previous year, with reduction of the previously posted deficit of £8,090.87 to a deficit of £3,951.53.
